

has offered its **Survivor Speak** program for the past 15 years. We will hear from Holocaust survivors or their descendants telling their stories, followed by a questionand-answer




session. The program will be presented in person at the library. Those who cannot attend may join by Zoom. ★


themselves) fiercely and unapologetically.


Library Book Group: Bewilderment




Paper Mill Playhouse's Children's Theater on Tour Performs Honk! Jr.

Library of the Chathams Receives Grant for ESL Program

The library's English as a Second Language (ESL) program has been running since 2018, first in person, and since the beginning of the pandemic, online. It attracts adult learners from the Chathams and surrounding towns who want to improve their English language skills. Volunteer tutors teach beginner, intermediate and advanced classes under the guidance of LEARN Associates, a language teaching company based in Basking Ridge, NJ.
